






EVOLV SECURITY TECHNOLOGY INSTALLED AT GROVEPORT MADISON HIGH SCHOOL

In response to rising concerns about safety within Groveport Madison High School, the Groveport Madison Safety Committee and school District administration have taken proactive steps to ensure a secure environment for students and staff alike. Through the installation of Evolv modern security technology, the District aims to address and mitigate potential threats. Evolv is a state-of-the-art system utilizing advanced AI-powered sensors to detect concealed weapons swiftly and accurately, enhancing security measures while minimizing disruption to daily activities. By prioritizing safety and embracing innovative solutions, Groveport Madison High School is reaffirming its commitment to fostering a safe learning environment for all.

The District also installed SCHOOL SAFE ID systems in all schools. Visitors are required to scan their driver's license or state-issued I.D. card. The system completes a quick background check and issues a self-adhesive visitor badge for guests who are approved to enter the building.





"JAVA WITH JAMIE" ALLOWS COMMUNITY TO CONNECT WITH SUPERINTENDENT

Superintendent Grube offers a more casual way for community members to interact with him one-on-one. His "Java with Jamie" outreach effort takes place monthly, allowing participants an opportunity to ask questions, voice concerns, or just stop by and chat. PRIMARYONE SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH CENTER OPEN FOR BUSINESS



Hello from PrimaryOne Health! My name is Doctor Janna Vargo, and I am the Optometrist at the Groveport Madison School-Based Health Center. I am excited to be working with your schools to provide students with comprehensive eye care. With 15 years of experience in optometry

and a passion for working with children, I assure you that my team and I will provide the highest quality of care, including comprehensive eye exams, glasses if needed, and emergency care.

We accept most major insurances, including Medicaid, Molina, and CareSource. For students without health insurance, we offer an Eyes of Hope program through Vision Service Plan (VSP) in collaboration with Prevent Blindness Ohio (PBO). The program provides free eye exams and glasses to qualifying students without vision insurance coverage.

Vision is crucial for a child's success in school. Poor vision affects academic performance, extracurricular activities, sports, and social/emotional development. School-age children should have a comprehensive eye exam once a year. I am here to help your kids thrive and succeed throughout their education journey.

We designed our service to be convenient for you. You can schedule an eye exam at any time by calling 614-586-4304 to reach the school-based health center's front desk or 614-645-5500 to reach the PrimaryOne Health scheduling department. We are open yearround, including summertime, and the vision team will be at the clinic on Mondays and Fridays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. I look forward to meeting all of you!

GMS TRANSPORTATION CENTER MOVES TO 4500 S. HAMILTON ROAD

In May 2023, the District purchased the former AEP Dispatching Center at 4500 S. Hamilton Rd. (across the street from GMHS) to house our Cruiser Accel Program. Designed to provide an alternative pathway to college and career readiness for sophomores, juniors, and seniors, Cruiser Accel supported the goals of over 200 GMHS students last year.

With the Cruiser Accel Program established, phase two of the property included moving our transportation center from our District Service Center at 4400 Marketing Place to 4500 S. Hamilton Rd. This will allow us more agility and efficiency for student pick-up and drop-off.

Enhancements and upgrades will include a brand new bus routing system called Traversa. This new routing system will improve vehicle tracking and the accuracy of bus stop times while automating many centralized data processes and simplifying reports.

We expect to finish work on our new transportation center by late summer.







Treasurer's Update

TREASURER'S FINANCIAL OUTLOOK


The successful renewal levy in November 2023 has significantly strengthened Groveport Madison Schools' financial stability. The District also saved over \$5 million in general funding during the 2023-24 school year, thanks to grant funds that facilitated cost-cutting across various areas, from paper supplies to bus transportation.

The new state funding formula has increased student funding, significantly impacting District finances. This increase, coupled with the successful refinancing of investments, will generate an additional \$240,000 in revenue over the next three years, further solidifying the District's financial position.

Groveport Madison Schools is committed to maintaining a watchful eye on expenses and implementing cost-saving measures wherever feasible. This dedication to financial prudence will continue to be a cornerstone of the District's operations.

DISTRICT CONTINUES TO BE MOST AFFORDABLE SCHOOL DISTRICT IN FRANKLIN COUNTY

Treasurer's Update

TREASURER'S OFFICE WORKS HARD TO SAVE COMMUNITY MILLIONS

With the collective effort of all departments in the District, Groveport Madison Schools has been able to save millions in general funding. At the beginning of the year, the Treasurer's Office initiated a cost-saving plan, and with the support and cooperation of all departments, we were able to cut expenses that would not hinder students or teachers. The Treasurer's Office took the lead and saved the general fund \$3.2 million over the year by reclassifying some funds to grants where applicable and cutting office costs.

The tangible results of our cost-saving efforts are evident. The Transportation Department, with the help of the Enrollment Office, saved over \$440,000 in transportation costs by reducing third-party transportation. The Superintendent saved the community \$743,000 annually with an administration restructuring. The District's Communications Office was able to save \$12,700. The Maintenance Department eliminated a contract, saving the District \$26,080, and the Curriculum Department was able to cut \$30,600 from the budget. These results reassure us that our efforts are making a significant difference.

The District is working diligently to find ways to save taxpayers money while prioritizing the best possible education for our students. Our commitment to providing quality education is our top priority, and we will continue to explore innovative ways to achieve this goal while being mindful of our financial responsibilities.

DISTRICT'S TREASURER'S OFFICE RECEIVES AUDITOR OF STATE AWARD

In recognition of his commitment to fiscal responsibility and transparent financial management, Groveport Madison Schools Treasurer Adam Collier has been honored with the prestigious Auditor of State Award. This accolade, awarded by the Ohio Auditor of State, commends Collier's exemplary stewardship in upholding the highest accountability standards within the school district.

Collier's exceptional leadership in financial administration has bolstered trust and confidence within the community. Under his guidance, Groveport Madison Schools has maintained a solid financial footing, navigating challenges with efficiency while prioritizing the needs of students and educators.

DISTRICT IS SEEKING BOND ISSUE FOR NEW MIDDLE SCHOOLS

Groveport Madison Schools is working on a bond issue that will replace the District's middle schools and add a small addition to the high school. The Board of Education has passed the initial resolutions to ask for and receive assistance from the State of Ohio to help pay for the buildings. The State's share of the cost is 53%, which means the taxpayer's burden is only 47%. Significantly, the bond will cost the homeowner of a \$100,000 home 23.4 cents per day—17.4 cents daily for taxpayers over 65. These funds will generate enough money to build three new middle schools and a small addition to the high school.

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

STATE OF OHIO: DISTRICT'S ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOLS EXCEED USEFUL LIFE

Since the late 1990s, the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) has advocated for replacing the District's elementary and middle schools. The OFCC's recent update of the District's Facilities Master Plan revealed that the existing schools need replacement and that the cost of renovating them is projected to be more than two-thirds the cost of new construction, a significant financial burden that underscores the cost-effectiveness of building new schools.

Student and staff safety is a paramount concern, and some of the buildings were constructed initially as "Open-Concept" schools, which lack permanent interior walls and doors. These areas are impossible to secure in the event of an emergency. In addition, the general age of the schools prevents them from being retrofitted with up-to-date safety and security systems, further exacerbating the safety concerns.


Additionally, many parking lots are undersized and cannot accommodate the traffic they must handle daily.

ENROLLMENT TREND LINE

The number of students attending Groveport Madison Schools has grown by more than 1,000 over the past ten years. The availability of reasonably priced homes and apartments is expected to continue to drive the District's enrollment growth for the foreseeable future.

THE IMPACT OF OVERCROWDING

Overcrowding, a pressing issue, significantly disrupts the learning environment for both students and staff. The District's decision to convert storage areas, offices, conference rooms, and even hallways into classrooms in many schools is a clear indication of the severity of the problem. The elimination of libraries at all elementary schools, while a necessary step, has further disrupted the learning environment. The absence of libraries has led to books and research materials being stored in storage cabinets or rolling carts lining hallways, creating a less conducive learning space.


Overcrowding even affects lunchtime for many students, with some eating lunch as early as 10:20 a.m. or as late as 1:30 p.m. Crowded lunchrooms and hallways are also very noisy, creating the perfect atmosphere for potential altercations between students.

There also are concerns about the impacts of overcrowding on student and staff safety. Parking lots and public streets alongside schools are jammed with cars, so much so that buses are sometimes unable to get into or out of the school's bus loop. Students whose classrooms are in modular units must go outdoors to get into the main building, which is of particular concern in an emergency or lock-down situation.


MODULAR CLASSROOMS - AN EXPENSIVE SOLUTION

The District currently has 24 modular classrooms to house our ever-growing enrollment. While modular classrooms can accommodate short-term enrollment growth, they are expensive solutions to temporarily address overcrowding. For example, purchasing and installing a used four-classroom modular unit at Groveport Elementary School costs more than \$400,000. In addition, modular classrooms are three times more expensive to operate (because of their energy inefficiency) than brick-and-mortar classrooms.
