Focus on Writing!!!

Focus on Writing!!! Every grade level is emphasizing the importance of writing, beginning with narratives. This is a great way to get students interested in writing because narratives can be personal, realistic or imaginative. Within each grade level, the expectations will look different. When provided a prompt, your child will be able to do the following:

Kindergarten: Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to narrate a single event or several loosely linked events, tell about the events in the order in which they occurred, and provide a reaction to what happened.

**Try at Home: Draw a picture that shows how you feel and then tell about what you drew.

1st Grade: Write narratives to recount two or more appropriately sequenced events, include some details regarding what happened, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide some sense of closure.

**Try at Home: Tell the Story - The Cows Go Shopping - Mrs. Cora Cow and her calf, Casey, have gone to the grocery store. Use pictures and words to tell what happens at the store.

2nd Grade: Write narratives to recount a well elaborated event or short sequence of events, include details to describe actions, thoughts, and feelings, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide a sense of closure.

**Try at Home: Write about a scary dream you had. How did you feel when you woke up?

3rd Grade: Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, descriptive details, and clear event sequences. a. Establish a situation and introduce a narrator and/or characters; organize an event sequence that unfolds naturally. b. Use dialogue and descriptions of actions, thoughts, and feelings to develop experiences and events or show the response of characters to situations. c. Use temporal words and phrases to signal event order. d. Provide a sense of closure.

**Try at Home: Write a story about a time when you helped a person or an animal in need. Think about how you felt when you helped the person or animal, and what you learned about helping others.

4th Grade: Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, descriptive details, and clear event sequences. a. Orient the reader by establishing a situation and introducing a narrator and/ or characters; organize an event sequence that unfolds naturally. b. Use dialogue and description to develop experiences and events or show the responses of characters to situations. c. Use a variety of transitional words and phrases to manage the sequence of events. d. Use concrete words and phrases and sensory details to convey experiences and events precisely. e. Provide a conclusion that follows from the narrated experiences or events **Try at Home: You have received a mysterious package from a friend. Inside is a very unusual egg. Write a story about what happens next. What does the egg look like? Does the egg hatch? What is inside it?

5th Grade: Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, descriptive details, and clear event sequences. a. Orient the reader by establishing a situation and introducing a narrator and/ or characters; organize an event sequence that unfolds naturally. b. Use narrative techniques such as dialogue, description, and pacing, to develop experiences and events or show the responses of characters to situations. c. Use a variety of transitional words, phrases, and clauses to manage the sequence of events. d. Use concrete words and phrases and sensory details to convey experiences and events precisely. e. Provide a conclusion that follows from the narrated experiences or events.

**Try at Home: Imagine you have discovered a time machine that can take you forwards or backwards in time. Write a story about the trip you make in the time machine. What time period would you select? What happens to you there? Would you like to stay there?


